Stories We Have Earned: The Stoney Nakoda Film Project

Stories We Have Earned: The Stoney Nakoda Film Project examines the exploitation of the Stoney Nakoda people's culture and customs for tourism and entertainment purposes through their involvement in events such as Banff Indian Days, the Calgary Stampede, and the dozens of Hollywood films they have appeared in.

Through interviews with Stoney Elders, the film explores how, by participating in the tourism industry and Hollywood films, the Stoney were allowed to gather and participate in ceremonies and cultural practices that were otherwise heavily restricted on the reserve due to government control of Stoney movement, including the pass system.
